POLAND – WILD BALTIC COAST

Work with Pioneers on the sharp edge of Nature Conservation. Ring endangered birds in Polish wilderness.

Bird migrations are one of the most spectacular phenomena of Nature. Since beginnings, humans have been fascinated by the ability to fly, navigation skills and endurance of these wonderful Sky Wanderers.

Some of us went a step further, trying to understand mechanisms behind bird passages. In early 1960s, a small group of such dedicated enthusiasts set up mist nets on the Baltic shore for the first time. One of the oldest bird ringing schemes in the world has just begun.

Every year, in Spring and Autumn, Operation Baltic workers conduct scientific research on birds migrating through Polish coast. Birds are ringed and weighed. We also assess their health and orientation.

Million 200 thousand birds of 208 species have been ringed so far. Why such huge numbers? Because of the unique, transit location of Polish Baltic Coast. For birds, it is a meeting point of their migration routes.

The Operation Baltic cooperates with the Polish Academy of Sciences and top Polish universities. It is renowned for long-lasting tradition, making it one of the oldest bird ringing schemes worldwide. **Research has been going on for more than a half a century!**

Operation Baltic and wildareas.net want you to become a vital part of the project. You have a unique opportunity to contribute to this world-class research and become our Volunteer.



What will I do?

You will handle the birds, taking them out from mist nets. Our duty will be to regularly check the nets installed near the camp. We will bring caught birds in small cotton bags to the camp where they will be ringed and assessed.

In the camp we will **record all observations** made by the ringer in special registry books. Species, ring number, sex, age, fat score, wing formula and weight will be recorded. Sometimes we collect parasites and blood samples.

After the assessment we will release the birds back to the wild.

The work is done in pairs or small groups in shifts. **Nets are checked every hour** during the day and every two hours during the night. In severe weather conditions it's every half an hour to prevent the animals from getting wet or cold in the nets.

We keep the camp area tidy and clean. We **cook common meals** and do the washing up. We also chop the wood for the wood burner.



Where will I stay?

- **In a truly unique place.** The camp is located on a narrow sandspit peninsula in the heart of a well known landscape park.

There is a reserve with ancient, 200 year-old beech trees and pine forests. There is a lot of wild boars, so don't be surprised to see them

The area is known for wild beaches and sand dunes. There are lots of tourists in the season, but now you will enjoy deep silence and solitude

of vast, open spaces.

The Staff and Volunteers sleep in tents that are provided on the site. The camp life goes on in bigger, industrial-like tents, heated with a wood burner if necessary.

There is an access to the electricity, gas and water – we have a generator and we shower in a separate bathroom tent with a camping shower or a bowl. We use a TOI-TOI toilet.



Free time!

With good organization of work **we can have plenty of free time.** The amount of free time varies and depends on decisions of the ringer. For example, if there are lots of birds in the nets, every pair of hands will be needed. But if there are only a few birds, the amount of free time increases. And then...

The idea is to try something new. Share our passions and learn from each other. Bring anything that crosses your mind – a game, an instrument that you play, a recipe for a delicious meal or other things that you find interesting. Tell us about your hobbies or your interesting job. Teach us unique skills that you have. **Share everything you want – it's up to you!**

In this beautiful place, you can:

- have a scenic walk on the beach
- look for ambers
- chat sitting by the fire
- play guitar
- take spectacular photos
- play games
- collect mushrooms
- cook delicious dinner
- have a nap
- chop the wood for the stove
- learn some Polish language!



Important: if you wish to take a longer walk or some time-consuming photo exploration, do inform the Ringer!

How much will it cost?



You will spend £485 on everything necessary.

The price includes transfers from the Assembly Point to the site and back, all food expenses and a place in the tent. It also covers our high-quality field training with the Certificate of Participation.

If you come from a Developing Country or have other less financially privileged background and you are struggling to cover the Participation Fee, reach out to us – a limited discount or other financial support might be available.

The price of time off is 58 GBP, regardless of chosen activities. For a single payment you gain access to them all. When applying, please specify if you are interested in it so that we can launch an online brainstorm and choose our favourite options.

Although our fee doesn't include plane tickets and insurance on the site, everything else **is covered for you** for the entire length of your stay with us.

Your questions answered

Do I have to know a lot about birds to participate?

You don't have to be a bird expert! Ornithological knowledge can be gained on the site. There are persons who help in the research not mainly for birds – they want to reconnect with nature or be a part of friendly community. Apart from ornithologists, our Volunteers are astronomers, businessmen, farmers, teachers, journalists and people from all walks of life.



Is mist netting safe for birds? Yes, this is a safe method of capturing birds. The nets are made of fine threads and the animals are removed from the nets regularly and often, so they are not at risks of a predator attack or exposed to harsh weather conditions.



What to bring?

All-weather clothing. You should definitely have a polar fleece and wind-proof jacket (winds are strong in the shore area) as well as comfortable hiking boots. In late Autumn – hat, scarf and gloves. You should have warm socks and spare set of clothes in case you get wet. Warm sleeping bag is a must. You can take your own waterproofs and wellies, but they are available on site. Another important stuff is a head-torch or a small torch. We don't have any binoculars, except a scope, so Birdwatchers are required to have own equipment. It will be useful to take an insect repellent. We don't have midges, but there are mosquitoes and ticks. You can also take a hand sanitizer, although there is water and soap on the site. Don't forget the electricity plugin adapter. Another useful item is a belt for trousers so that you can attach wader straps. It is more suitable to pack your stuff in a rucksack that in a suitcase with wheels. It may be comfortable to bring a vacuum flask.



What is provided on the site?

Full board and lodging. Operation Baltic provides tents with very thick foam mattresses and blankets. The food is also covered, but you should inform us if you have any allergies or intolerances. Pots, plates, mugs and cutlery are provided. We also have waterproofs and wellies as well as waders.

Can I bring my own tent? Yes. Persons needing more privacy can bring their own tent.



I am a ringer. Will I be able to ring birds on the camp?

Unfortunately no. Polish law doesn't allow foreign license holders to ring birds in Poland without a suitable calibration.

Health & Safety tips

Bring a proof of your insurance with you, European Health Insurance Card is the best option.

Report any allergies or diseases to us before you arrive. Take all necessary medicaments that you use. First aid kit is on site, but it contains only basic supplies.

Beware of ticks. In Poland they transmit borreliosis and Tick Borne Encephalitis. There's a vaccination against TBE and it is recommended that you vaccinate yourself. If you notice a tick on your skin, you should remove it as soon as possible. Shower everyday is a good idea – ticks will be removed by the running water. It's difficult to spot them regarding their size – below is an image of a tick on a grass stem.

Sosnowsky's hogweed (*Heracleum sosnowskyi*) is a poisonous plant that you might encounter in Poland. Don't touch it – it causes severe burns. It is a tall, impressive umbellifer, reaching up to 4 meters of height.


Don't forget to wash hands before eating – you will handle animals living in the wild.

Birds of prey, herons and owls can be dangerous. Unexperienced Participants have to leave them to more experienced team members or ringers. (Passerines generally aren't dangerous. They peck and scratch but won't do you any harm.)
